

## A Short History of Case Inst.

Among the first cares of the  
Pilgrim Fathers, on reaching these  
shores, was the establishment of  
schools. True to the traditions  
of their ancestors the members  
of the S. I. Co., recognizing  
the necessity of education  
in the South, about fifteen  
years ago resolved to build a  
school-house. The company,  
at this time was composed  
of men born, bred, and living  
in Connecticut; but they  
were liberal and desirous  
of elevating their employees.

They gave the site and erected  
this building with no expense  
to the inhabitants of Shelby.

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The total cost was about \$2000. The company engaged, as teachers, graduates of the best colleges; and so long as they remained in charge, gave five school-arships each year.

The school derives its name from the late Newton Case, of Hartford, - a large-hearted, generous man, then president of the S. C. He gave the desks and other furniture for its equipment.

The first religious services in this Church were held Sunday, Sept. 11, 1881. The attendance at Sunday School was sixty eight. The day school opened the next morning with Rev. F. J. Tyler, Pastor of

the Church, as Principal.

Mr. Tyler taught two years and gave very general satisfaction.

He was succeeded by Mr. Samuel G. Cate who was in charge until June 1885.

The next fall Mr. Wm. C. Knise, a graduate of Hamilton College, New York, became principal. He was an excellent teacher and under him the school rapidly increased in numbers. He was, however, too valuable to be kept, and gave up his position here to accept the principalship of a larger school near his former home. He was the first of these teachers with whom I am personally acquainted. I received of

him my first instruction in  
the three great "R" Reading,  
Riting, and Rithoretic.

Mr. W. H. Bates, of Oberlin  
College, was the next to come.  
He found the school in such  
a flourishing that he deemed  
an assistant necessary. He  
employed for this purpose  
Miss. Sadi Davis, a worthy  
lady and competent teacher,  
residing in the town. Mr.  
Bates resigned his position here,  
to accept the Professorship of  
English and Latin in the State  
Normal School at Florence.  
Having remained there two  
years, he returned to Oberlin,  
to study theology. The Professor  
wished very much to enlarge

the sphere of the school so that  
its benign influence might be  
felt beyond the limits of the vil-  
lage. There were dreams of an  
academy or perhaps a college,  
but the time for these things  
had not yet come.

Prof. Geo. A. Clarke, of the  
College at Hillsdale, Mich., as-  
sumed control Oct. 1, 1857.  
He was assisted by Miss Sadie  
Davis during the first year. The  
following summer Mr.  
Clark went home and  
returned with the Misses Ellis  
who helped him the second  
year. But they concluded to  
renounce teaching as a  
profession, Miss Louisa Ellis  
becoming Mrs. Clark, and Miss

Louise Mrs. Chisholm. Then  
 Prof. Locke brought down  
 the Messrs. Betts, ladies of standing  
 worth, who assisted him in  
 conducting the school with  
 great credit until June 1890.

Miss Laura V. Stoughton, the  
 present principal, took charge  
 in the autumn of the same  
 year. Ever since, assisted  
 by Miss Agnes Avery, she has  
 managed the school with marked  
 ability and has given univer-  
 sal satisfaction.

At the close of Prof. Locke's  
 term John Stoughton left for  
 Auburn College and C. J.  
 Christian for the University  
 of Alabama. The next year  
 witnessed the departure of

four more of our pupils, Will <sup>W</sup>atson  
 to Oberlin, L. E. and L. A. Christian  
 to U. of A., and E. C. Avery to  
 Ala. Polytechnic Inst. at Auburn.  
 Afterwards Miss. Isla Avery went  
 to the Judson and C. F. Netherby  
 to Oberlin.

Some of these have returned  
 to us, some are still at college  
 & while others are filling positions  
 of honor and usefulness  
 where. The former pupils of  
 this school are scattered over  
 half the Nation and we  
 are sure that they still feel  
 the influence of the knowledge  
 gathered here.

Long may it flourish, and may  
 we; who are here now, and  
 those who will be here in the future.

lay foundations for our education  
 of which we shall not be ashamed,  
 and leave a record of  
 which our friends may justly  
 be proud. To our teachers past  
 and present let us render  
 due appreciation, and to  
 our friends who have ever  
 given unflinching encourage-  
 ment, grateful thanks.

A. W. North, who had been appointed financial agent by the investors, arrived at Shelby with a large bank account to draw on. It was expected that \$120,000 for reconstruction and the \$90,000 for settlement of debts would meet the expenditures of the reconstruction. This expectation proved to be much too optimistic and before reconstruction had been completed the total amount had risen to \$212,000, with many old accounts still unsettled.

At Shelby, North found that his checks, which were written on the First National Bank at Hartford, were sought after. Banking facilities in the South were very limited. Consequently, checks that were sound and could be cashed for full value were sought after, not only by merchants, but by bankers as well.<sup>44</sup>

the control to the northern party. Despite this, the stockholders accepted the contract without a dissenting vote.<sup>41</sup>

In April, the stockholders met again to elect directors as called for in the contract. At that meeting, four of the northern investors were elected to the Board of Directors, along with three old stockholders; the number of directors having been increased to seven. The directors elected at that time were: A. G. West, A. W. North, Newton Case, and Henry Stanley, representing the new stockholders, and John W. Lapsley, A. T. Jones, and A. A. Sterrett, representing the old stockholders. John W. Lapsley was re-elected president.<sup>42</sup> The new stockholders who invested in Shelby stock under the contract signed January 18, 1868, were as follows:

as opportunity arose. West and North found the Negroes to be the most reliable workers at the time reconstruction began, but before work was completed they were disappointed in both white and Negro laborers. Neither group proved to be as efficient as expected.

Consequently, at West's request, North asked Newton Case to secure twenty-five German families to send to Shelby as laborers. One-fourth of them he wanted to be farmers, so they could grow produce for all the employees. Producing food would eliminate buying it from other regions, saving the high cost of transportation and thereby making a large saving for the company.<sup>10</sup> Newton Case thought well of the idea, thinking it would be to the benefit of the immigrants as well as the company. He appealed to an associate in Michigan to help with the project, but the German workers were never secured.<sup>11</sup>

Soon after arriving at Shelby, North went to work at setting up a school program. By April 10, 1868, the school was opened and classes had begun.\* Books were
